

Science and Engineering

According to "Creek Care, A Guide for Urban Marin Residents", "A watershed is the entire area that drains into a distinct creek or river system. It includes major and minor creeks, seasonal drainages, storm drains, the riparian corridor, flood plains, and land that water flows over or under on its way to a creek or bay." In other words, it is all the land from ridge to ridge; it is also all the processes and actions going on. The complexity of the systems at work interacting in the watershed is daunting: geology, soil science, botany, zoology, insect life-cycles, fish, foxes, climate, physics, human designs, social systems, aesthetic drives. Some studies MVSK (Mill Valley StreamKeepers) refer to are Recovery Strategy for California Coho Salmon, Report to the California Fish and Game Commission, Nov. 2003, and Marin County Watershed Management Plan Draft, April, 2004.

MVSK is using a \$13,750 MMWD grant for an engineer to analyse barriers in our streams' salmonid watershed habitat.

Mill Valley Planning: New Design Guidelines ~ Current Construction

The picture above is a residentially zoned land with a seasonal stream at its base. The location is above the intersection of Monte Vista and Hazel Avenue in the Redwood canyon above Old Mill Creek. Along with 170 Rose Avenue, application for a permit to build a house triggered a city moratorium on building on steep lots in 2000. The city appointed two committees to work on code and open space priorities. This summer the city planning staff plans to publish a booklet to help landowners with the Design Guidelines.

Much to the dismay of homeowners and walkers in the area, all of the California Bay trees, almost a hundred, have been cut down to about two feet tall. "It looks like a clearcut", "I moved to the area because I liked the forest," and "How is erosion going to be prevented" are typical comments. When asked why he did it, the developer said that he felt the bays were leaning precariously, the view shed is opened up, fire safety, he needed to put in a sewer line, and the trees would resprout making a brushy, shrubby look.

Discussion about aesthetics, fire safety management, and responsibility to neighbors is open to debate. Our urban challenge is to educate one and all about the web of life, the chemistry and physics of slopes, drainage, plant roots and leaf cover. Tools of mitigation such as the bioswale and permeable paving proposed by Marin Horizon School, green roofs, replanting with natives, maintaining wildlife corridors can be employed in producing a masterpiece of restoration and protection of the watershed.

New Open Space Acquisitions

The best way to prevent destruction of habitat on a piece of land and to prevent imbalance of stormwater runoff is to own the land and not develop it. The Open Space Committee, chaired by John Leonard, is working to acquire for the city the 22 properties designated as high priority by one of the 2 committees working during Mill Valley's moratorium. The city and the fund raisers are accepting funds for the first purchase of a property at the base of the Tenderfoot Trail. Although a \$25 per year tax for open space acquisition was found to be politically favored in a poll, the committee has been reticent to add it to other ballot requests. If you want to donate at least \$25 a year for starters towards this purpose, mail your check to TCC, Mill Valley Open Space, PO Box 2272, Mill Valley, CA 94942. The committee is thrilled to have received two very generous donations. Both were pieces of land near the Tenderfoot Trail property. About 3 acres were designated to the city as a conservation easement by Russell Lemle. An entire lot, 4 acres, was donated to the city by Eva and Paul Griffin who live in Davis. These lands are in the headwaters of Old Mill Creek bearing Steelhead Trout and the site of nests of the endangered owl, the Northern Spotted Owl. The trees keep the water cool enough for reestablishment of Coho Salmon.


Education
