2013 Accomplishments

LONG RANGE:

Extended research reading code drafts and code of other counties and municipalities resulting in suggestions and recommendations to follow good example of Santa Cruz's environmental codes.

Public Testimony at Marin County Board of Supervisors Public Hearing for San Geronimo Valley Coho Salmon Enhancement Plan Ordinance Adoption.

Served on the Mill Valley subcommittee on Natural Resources for the General Plan revision.

Public Testimony at Mill Valley Planning Commission and City Council on the General Plan 2040.

Met with Mill Valley Chief Planner, Michael Moore, and senior planner, Danielle Staude to increase accuracy of General Plan.

HABITAT RESTORATION

Mill Valley Beautification Day and Earth Day: maintenance on rain garden, planting native plants, and creekside clean up.

Used native plants from a donor and from Julie Hanft's Greenwood School Native Plant Nursery initially supported by MVSK.

Distributed \$24,000 in grant money for salmon habitat restoration to STRAW (Students and Teachers Restoring All Watersheds) for planning and work on 200 feet of streambank on 3 Wells path.

Collaborated with Boy Scout Jake Marquis on Eagle project of *Carex pendula* removal and streamside restoration of ferns, grasses, and rushes along 400 feet of streambank..

Consulted with numerous vegetation specialists and met with California Department of Fish and Wildlife, EPA, Corps of Engineers on assessing need for permit for creekbank work.

Paid for \$1800 worth of native plants for restoration of creekside along Old Mill Creek and Arroyo Corte Madera del Presidio Creek.

RESPONSES

Responded to numerous phone and email requests leading to advising citizens, field visits, studying records at the city and county.

Issues regarding Evergreen Sidewalk and construction in Homestead Valley were investigated. Met with concerned citizens.

Wrote articles for Trees Foundation publications.

Visited Old Mill School to see installation of Steelhead aquarium installed by the Tiburon Salmon Institute.

Worked with Clean Mill Valley Committee and wrote letter supporting grant application for special water fountains.

Attendance and representation at numerous meetings including North Bay Watershed Council and Association, Marin Conservation League Water Committee, public representative on MCSTOPPP Citizen Advisory Committee, Southern Marin Watershed Technical Working Group, Watershed Alliance of Marin.

Successfully applied for grants including awards for newsletter and for *Carex pendula* removal..

Continuing discussions with city and county watershed planners and engineers, the Tam Valley Service District, and SASM, the Sewerage Agency of Southern Marin.

EDUCATIONAL:

Educational programs at Mill Valley Community Center arranged by Ann Fricker, Environmental Forum participant, and Tamalpais Valley Community Center with Laura Chariton of Watershed Alliance of Marin and others speaking about watersheds.

Created MV Library Case display about sea level rise and the effect on watershed issues.

Annual Newsletter Publication.

Paid for Elementary School classes' education sessions by STRAW.
